Rules Revisions

1. Neck laceration protector required for all players and goalkeepers.
2. Control of the puck is the act of propelling the puck with the stick, hand or feet. Control is not lost when contact with the puck is made by an opponent, the boards or the net, providing the player in control continues to propel the puck.
3. The last player to physically touch the puck with the stick or body shall be considered in possession of the puck.
